

Peter and John:

'We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard'. (Acts 4 v. 20.)

When Peter healed a crippled beggar, it was obvious that some people would think it was a fraud, some would be mystified and some would see it as a miracle from God.

The rulers, elders and teachers of the law, who saw it, didn't deny that it was a miracle, but still wanted to suppress it from spreading further. So, they commanded the disciples not to speak or teach in the name of Christ.

Confronted by the truth (which they acknowledged was the truth), they still wanted to suppress it.

Why is it that some who encounter God's truth, still do not want to acknowledge it, or act upon it? Is it fear of losing control or status, peer pressure, not wanting to believe? Probably many reasons, for, as we encounter God's truth, there is always a moment of decision. Do I want to follow what I have learned, or do I ignore it, and pretend it hasn't happened, and get on with my life?

I know that I have been reluctant in the past in accepting God's hand held out to me. Perhaps you, too, have done so at times. Thankfully, He gives us lots of chances and encouragements to turn around and acknowledge that He is God, and He loves us and would not lead us where we do not want to go. When we do take that step towards Him, time and again we discover our fears are groundless. For our lives are free, and, always, the choice is ours.

For Peter and John, it was a call to tell of what they had discovered. For each of us, there are paths which are right for us, all leading to God's purpose for us. And always for the good, maybe for others and always for our relationship with Him.

General Synod backs day of prayer for persecuted Christians around the world

Editor: We have run this report long, so that you can get a good picture of the worldwide situation. It is critical issue for the Church in our time, as millions of our fellow Christians are facing persecution, imprisonment and even death — simply for being a Christian.

The C of E's General Synod has voted to create a day of prayer for Christians who face oppression and violence around the world.

A background paper highlighted the plight of millions of Christians worldwide facing high levels of persecution and discrimination for their faith. In North Korea, where Christianity is illegal, believers risk imprisonment, torture, or execution. Similarly, in parts of the Middle East like Iraq and Syria, extremist groups like ISIS have targeted Christians, leading to mass displacement and atrocities.

In China, the government imposes strict regulations on religious practices, frequently raiding and demolishing unregistered churches. Sub-Saharan Africa also sees severe persecution, with Nigeria's Boko Haram attacking Christian villages, churches, and schools, resulting in countless deaths and abductions. In Pakistan, blasphemy laws are often misused to unjustly imprison

Christians and incite mob violence against them.

A 2024 report by 'Open Doors' concluded that 317 million Christians face 'very high or high levels of persecution' across its ranking. This equates to one in seven Christians worldwide. Geographically, it found that one in five Christians face persecution in Africa and two in five Christians face persecution in Asia. The top five countries are: North Korea, Somalia, Libya, Eritrea and Yemen.

Background information provided to Synod members also highlighted existing initiatives to highlight the plight of persecuted Christians, including #RedWednesday and The International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church – together with initiatives more broadly aimed at promoting Freedom of Religion or Belief (FoRB) such as the International Day Commemorating the Victims of Acts of Violence Based on Religion or Belief.

The Pew Research Centre has reported that overall FoRB is in decline, paralleling the global deterioration of democracy and human rights in general. Its 2024 report found that government restrictions on religion – laws, policies and actions by state officials that limit religious beliefs and

practices – reached a new peak globally in the year it covers (2021). Harassment of religious groups and interference in worship were two of the most common forms of government restrictions worldwide in 2021.

As a response to this crisis, the Synod backed the motion from the Diocese of London which highlighted the issue, and has proposed a national ecumenical day of prayer and action dedicated to the Persecuted Church.

The Bishop of Winchester, Philip Mounstephen, said: "The biggest threat is from overbearing, authoritarian nationalistic governments who are bolstered by their own particular theology: so Putin's regime in Russia is bolstered by the concept of Russkiy Mir: a theology shamefully expounded by the Russian Orthodox Church.

"President Xi's ambitions for Chinese hegemony are bolstered by the ancient concept of Tianxia: literally 'all under heaven' – a geopolitical system with China at the centre and Xi at the centre of the centre.

"All these ideologies are very bad news for minorities of every sort, and bad news for the wider world too."

On why you should never replace your hymn books . . .

My Dear nephew Darren

I am surprised you are considering buying a new set of hymn books for your church. I had assumed everything you sang would be projected on to one of those screens which are invariably placed to obscure the altar.

In my – fortunately limited – experience of such devices, they provide the projectionist with endless opportunities for showing the wrong hymn, or the right hymn but from another edition, which will contain either one verse too many or one too few. Should the hymn run to two pages, then the turnover always takes place some milliseconds after that verse has started, so that the congregation is faced with the snap decision of either trying to sing two lines at double time, or just to join in late, making a nonsense of the words.


When we decided to change hymn books some years ago, the reverberations made the consequences of that little event in Sarajevo seem insignificant. The proposal was to move from *Hymns Ancient and More Ancient* to the more recent version: *Hymns Ancient and Slightly Less Ancient*.

Colonel Wainwright said he would be happy so long as we continued fighting good fights and urging Christian soldiers onwards. The men wanted the hymns they remembered from school, the ladies those they sang at their weddings, and no one would consider anything that dropped 'thines' or 'wouldsts'. The basses in the choir wanted hymns they knew the tenors found difficult and those who couldn't read music wanted more hymns sung in unison. When a rumour started that the books may contain hymns written in the last 50 years, timetables were consulted for bus services to the next village.

Eventually we reached a perfect compromise: doing something which made no change whatsoever. Miss Simpson was charged with buying yards of sticky backed plastic and repairing the current books. She put a note on the front of every copy that if the page for the hymn they wanted was missing, they should share with the person sitting next to them – an experience which will be almost as traumatic as being invited to pass the peace. Yet another decision has thereby been deferred for a Church Council to make some time next century. Harmony reigns once again.

Charity of the Month for September ~ Christian Family Concern

It all began with the founding of Haven of Hope in 1893 by Janet Ransome Wallis in East London after the death of her daughter when her son was seriously ill. She saw other mothers who were so scared to leave the hospital as they had nowhere to go with the child. She prayed for her son to recover and vowed that if he did she would devote her life to helping the mothers and children less fortunate. The son survived and so she began the charity which was to change many lives.

Initially there were 12 cots for the children but a year later they were all full and so the charity moved to bigger premises in Walthamstow which could accommodate 40 children up to the age of 10 years.

Through the years the charity moved a number of times to increase the number of children and mothers it could help, into the 1900's. In 1908 they became a limited company and the following year lobbied the Royal Commission to make a change in the Poor Law stating that unsupported mothers and children were not well cared for in the workhouse. Janet's aim was to provide care for the mother during the pregnancy and after, with the child having foster parents or being adopted. In 1913 two maternity homes were purchased, one in Streatham and the other in Denmark Hill. By 1914 Janet's husband had joined her in the venture.

When World War 1 broke out there was more demand for unsupported mothers needing help. The charity changed its

When World War 1 broke out there was more demand for unsupported mothers needing help. The charity changed its name again to Mission of Hope. By 1922 they were running six children's homes. Janet retired when her daughter took over in 1924. IN 1934 the charity was reconstituted as a 'Faith Mission' and meant that they would trust in God to provide the financial support and help they needed. After the death of Janet her daughter Adeline continued to increase the size and the numbers of people it helped. In 1980 it merged with an adoption society that it had closely worked with. In 1980 it became 'Christian Family Concern' and not long after the adoption agency closed and records were given to the local authority.

Currently the charity provides supported housing for new mothers to help them adjust and learn to care for a child, nursery places for children and a counselling service for everyone regardless of gender, religion or race. 

Our halls are hired for various private functions like birthday parties, baby showers, awards presentations, etc. To facilitate this we need caretakers to do the following;



Emerson Park police station in July 1965

Fifty years ago, there was a police station on the Southend Arterial Road, about 300 yards east of Squirrels Heath Road traffic lights, backing on to Harwood Avenue. I think its official name was Emerson Park police station. Why, I don't know. It's nowhere near Emerson Park. In fact, there were three semidetached residences, known locally as the Police Houses. All six homes were rented to police families. Essex Constabulary, who maintained law and order in Havering until 1965, didn't spend money on paint. The Police Houses always looked grim. Nowadays, they are cheerfully painted private properties. I lived opposite during my early years but I don't recall any children from the Police Houses. Probably they were starter homes, let to young married coppers until they could buy their own places. Everybody called it the police station — never the cop shop or any other rude nickname. The actual police station was a ground-floor office at the right-hand side of the centre building. If there were cells, I never saw them! The Arterial Road carriageways were

swallowed by road widening. Patrolling on bikes, the bobbies got to know local people. When my father was gardening out front, constables sometimes stopped to gossip. In front of the police station stood an air-raid siren, a relic of World War Two. It was used to summon volunteer firemen for emergencies. The long steady note of the All Clear was a familiar noise. One day, around 1960, something went wrong, and the siren let off the warbling, howling Air Raid warning. It's the only time I've ever heard that stomach-churning sound of the Blitz. This was the era of the Cold War against Russia. If nuclear conflict broke out, we would get four minutes' warning — if that. There was mild panic locally. One lady ran around shouting, "Are we going to be bombed? Are we going to be bombed? In 1963, I was one of a team of youngsters who put on a satirical review. Satire was popular, but theatre censorship was still in force. Scripts had to be submitted to an official called the Lord Chamberlain before being allowed on stage. Two of my sketches were banned. I'm still

proud of that achievement. One of our skits involved a police officer. We had no budget for costumes, so I called into the police station and explained our problem. Without hesitation, a young constable lent me his helmet, which I returned after the show. I wonder if that would happen today?

Although it was main road location, I don't remember police cars. In fact, they were a new form of policing. The iconic TV series, *Z-Cars*, only began in 1962. Indeed, the police station wasn't ideally located for police cars. It was too close to the congested traffic lights for a quick getaway. The Arterial Road police station closed in April 1965. I suppose this was part of a reorganisation when Havering became part of Greater London, and transferred to the Metropolitan Police. Officialdom didn't explain much in those days, so I don't know.


