St James the Least of All

Editor: The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tonguein-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace'...

On why the C of E should never combine parishes . . .

From: The Rectory, St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

I suppose it had to come, but combining parishes is now firmly on the agenda for our villages. I had always wondered what the first Earl of Stowe was trying to prove, building a church here in 1347 to accommodate 800 people when the total population has never exceeded 250. In the short term – which in this village is measured in centuries-it seems to have been to house the tombs of his 13 successors. I now realise it was to make uniting with adjoining parishes in the 21st century more difficult. Clearly the first Earl had formidable foresight. None of our neighbouring churches seem too keen to share their reserves to help maintain our cathedral-sized building. The threat of the closure of St Herve the Bard has, inevitably, caused outrage - not so much from its regular congregation of three, but from all those in the village who would never think of attending. People do so *like* to have a church not to go to. The church of St Bregowine, built by a wealthy parishioner in the 19th century because she did not like the high church practices of the parish church of St Iwig, is refusing to re-unite, even though the two churches stand only 100 yards apart, in a village with a diameter of 300 yards. If only they could get over the trauma of seeing the incumbent putting water in the wine on Easter Day in 1894. (Although it must be conceded that the Bregowinians were equally affronted that when the daughter church opened in 1895, they found that the Iwigers had provided no brass troughs at the end of the pews for umbrellas. That they have subsequently refused to install them has only compounded the offence.)

Meanwhile St Plegmund is in discussions with the Church of South India as a way of avoiding uniting with anyone. Should it happen, I will be interested to see what travelling expenses the new incumbent claims. It will be difficult to tell when the present incumbent resigns, as he has not been seen at a clerical meeting for the last 30 years. Some of my colleagues suspect he is mythical, that a bloodless coup took place in the 1980s and that the church is now entirely run by the Mothers' Union. The church of St Maximus of Constantinople in our nearest town has rather grandly offered to take all of our churches under its wing, but as a parishioner has pointed out: how could we possibly consider joining with a parish that fought on the other side at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485.

In the meantime, we will serenely carry on, as we seem to have done for the past six centuries; parish mergers and reductions in numbers of clergy seem to be of less interest than debating the suggestion that we change the brand of coffee served after Services.

Charity of the Month for November \sim a second month with Through the Roof

This charity began with the gifted writer and speaker Joni Eareckson Tada in the 1980's. She started to give disabilities a higher profile in churches worldwide through her tours. There was a major European church conference of Joni and Friends in 1994 in Hungary. There were 28 UK delegates and among them was Paul Dicken who lectured on 'The Accessible Gospel' and publisher Colin Reeves. The idea emerged at follow-up meetings that a UK branch of Joni and Friends could be effective. The concept was to promote to UK churches the awareness of disability and the full inclusion of them in Christian ministry. It was to cover all forms of disability.

In 1996 Paul asked the USA board of Joni and Friends to endorse the UK version to aid the fledgling ministry. It was agreed and Colin was asked to form a board and become the chair, a seeding donation was also given. In 1997 Paul started the ministry in his home by writing to 300 JAF supporters who then became the core support group. Later that year Joni spoke to packed UK meetings in Sailsbury cathedral and Westminster Chapel, which attracted many new supporters. In Belfast at the Whitewell Metropolitan Tabernacle over 1,000 disabled people attended.



The pastor prayed at the meeting drawing an analogy from the banquet account in Luke 14 'Go out quickly into the streets and alleys of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame....' Now over 100 disabled

people attend church each Sunday. When the Disability Discrimination Act came into effect demand for TTR skills and materials grew. This was a key part

of the Churches for All campaign, with simple guidelines for church personnel.

Through the Roof continues its core ministry while readily adapting to new opportunities and partnerships echoing Christ's call to 'Go out to the roads and country lanes and make them come in, so that my house will be full'. Remembering Frank Spall who died recently aged 98 years

On Monday 30th September, his family, members of his church and around 30 ex Thresholders attended a Service of Celebration for Frank's life at his church in Hastings. Frank and his wife Frances came to Hornchurch in 1955. They attended confirmation classes at St Andrew's and soon became active members of the Parish. Throughout their time at St Andrew's they organised Parish Socials, Barn Dances and Rambles but their greatest claim to fame must have been leading the Thresholders Youth Club at the Large North Street Hall for 36 years! Many people from St Andrew's and many of those who have grown up in Hornchurch will remember Frank and Frances Spall with fondness and admiration. For those of you who may not have heard of the Thresholders (which incidentally was at one time, the largest youth club in Essex) let me explain. This was no ordinary youth club that young people turned up to every week to listen to music, play snooker, darts or table tennis and chat with friends over coffee in a safe welcoming atmosphere. It was that, but so much more! There were regular Club outings to the seaside, rambles, night hikes, weekends away, annual variety shows, dances and discos, all organised and enabled by Frank and Frances and their team of dedicated helpers. However, central to it all was the sharing of the Christian faith. On Thursdays there was always a short break in the middle of the evening for notices and prayers. Thresholders had been set up initially by the curate Hugo Wallace and then the Revd Tony Bowering but very soon adults from the church were recruited and eventually Frank and Frances took over with their friends and helpers Harry and Lily Hepworth and Win Boxhall to name but a few. The purpose of Thresholders was: 'To help young men and women on the Threshold of life to accept Christ'. In order to enjoy all the activities on a Thursday evening, young people had to attend the Thresholder Service at the hall each Sunday morning. This



was a short act of worship with hymns, readings and prayers and for some time there was even a Thresholder Choir! Attendance here (or those who preferred, church) was not an option, a membership card was date stamped and had to be shown to gain entry on a Thursday evening. It all sounds rather like blackmail but hundreds of young people over the years accepted these conditions and were encouraged and inspired by the dedication and faith of Frank and Frances. Some of these young people were from church families but the majority were not. There were many other youth clubs to choose from including Robert Beard which had far more facilities, but many young people chose to attend Thresholders. This was outreach big time! Frank and Frances had no children of their own but with Thresholders they cared for the biggest family that you could imagine! The door of their house in Chestnut Ave was always open, they were always there with a listening ear, to share problems and joys over a cup of tea and a biscuit. By any standards Frank was a rémarkable man, his disarming smile and strong welcoming handshake could tame the toughest, and most undesirable-looking youth looking to be admitted to a Thresholders dance or disco! Not that such encounters

were always trouble free! An electrician by trade, Frank was always ready to use his skills for the good of others and was often involved with installation and maintenance projects at St Andrew's. When he retired in 1991 and moved to Hastings this continued as he soon became Church Warden and chief handyman at his local church. He didn't stop there though, he loved life and kept busier than ever. He learned to tap dance, he gave ballroom dancing lessons at his church, he played the guitar at services, he led regular 5 mile rambles and he even took a masseurs course! Until very recently he volunteered with Shop Mobility in Hastings repairing electric mobility scooters.

The tributes paid to Frank during the last few weeks are testament to what a remarkable man he was and how much he and Frances influenced so many lives for the good. The Revd Jeremy Allum was curate at St Andrew's from 1962 until 1967 and was chaplain to the Thresholders youth club for that time and subsequently a good friend to Frank. He recently wrote a tribute to Frank on the Thresholders Facebook page telling of his admiration for the dedication and incredible commitment of both Frank and Frances to the young people of Hornchurch. He ended his tribute with these words:

"I would fail Frank however if I were not to record that for Frank and Frances their personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ was both a rock and a magnetic North. It underpinned his life's work. Thresholders was his expression of his faith, showing his care and love for the youngsters of Hornchurch. This meant that the club was to be a place where Faith and Fun in Sorrow and in Joy were woven seamlessly together. He lived faith so naturally. He will be missed. May he rest in peace and rise in glory."


Programmes continue on the 1st & 3rd Wednesdays during December.


