Away in a Manger



At this time of year, we (rightly) tend to look ahead to Jesus' birth; the "Little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay". As we enter the season of Advent, a season of waiting, we are reminded of the wonder of God coming among us in Jesus – fully human and fully divine. Of course, the "Little Lord Jesus" did grow. In his Gospel, Luke tells us that He "increased in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favour" (Luke 2:52). This season isn't limited to Jesus the baby; it's also about Jesus the man.

- A hymn that I particularly like (though not an Advent or Christmas hymn) begins with the words, "Jesus Christ is waiting, waiting in the streets". It is a hymn which urges us to respond to Jesus – to wait on Him, to work for the Kingdom's causes, to actively care for others, and to seek to cast out hatred with love. Even as He is waiting, Jesus calls us to join him; the hymn puts it as an invitation, a question: "Who will join My journey?".
- Advent is not a season for static wating; we do not (or at least should not) just stay in one place, watching the days go by. Advent is a journey, towards Bethlehem, towards the "Little Lord Jesus". It is also the start of the Church's year, when perhaps we can make a New Year's Resolution and recommit to following and joining Jesus in service of others, working for the Kingdom's causes, in active care, and in **Revd Lisa Bewick** seeking to show love.

and Christmas described as entering "The Tinsel Tunnel" – an ideal time for the church to reach out into the community and share the Gospel message: the good news of Jesus Christ. It is also a time when we can allow Jesus to speak through us, inviting others to join His journey, to commit to following Him. It is a time when we can join Jesus in the streets: waiting; raging against injustice, and seeking to bring hope; reaching out to others; and calling others to His journey, to His way.

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

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The Visit of His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester to Hornchurch War Graves. Tuesday 26th November 2024



HRH the Duke of Gloucester visited Hornchurch cemetery and St Andrew's churchyard on Tuesday 26th November. The Duke is Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal New Zealand Army Medical Corps and has a personal interest in New Zealand, history, culture etc.

The Clergy were asked that this visit not be publicized around the parish because of the current security

situation.

On arrival the Duke was introduced to the Mayor of Havering, Jerry O'Sullivan, our Revd Ken Wylie,, Brigadier Lisa Ferris of the New Zealand Army, currently at the New Zealand High Commission, Gareth Hardware of the Commonweath War Graves Commission (CWGC) and Tony Matthews the volunteer leader of the CWGC team responsible for the maintenance of the graves in Hornchurch and Havering. *See Bullseye edition February 2024*

The party first made their way to the War memorial in the main War Graves area of Hornchurch Cemetery. Revd Ken led prayers and a minutes silence was kept. Then the Duke laid a wreath followed by the Deputy Lieutenant, the Mayor, Brigadier Ferris and Carole Barratt of the Royal British Legion Hornchurch Branch. Tony Matthews has details of all the Commonwealth War graves on his iPad and he was able to tell the Duke about those graves, like that of Raimund Sanders Draper, that

are of obvious interest, and every other grave that the Duke inquired about, in particular the three New Zealand pilots buried here. He asked how many men were pilots, how many air crew and the number killed in accidents not combat. The party then moved on to St Andrew's churchyard and the WWI graves.

We knew that the Duke had a particular wish to see the graves of the 4 servicemen from Nuie who served with the New Zealand Army at Grey Towers Camp during WWI. He stopped and gave attention to the row of Royal Flying Corps graves that line the main path through the Conservation Area and Mr Matthew's could be heard giving details as required.

He was very interested *Cont. from P4* in the graves and the men and women buried locally and asked some imaginative questions about the service personnel concerned and spent some time discussing the churchyard and grave maintenance.

The Duke and the Deputy Lieutenant then left with their escort to their next engagement and the civic, church and military delegation were invited for refreshment at the RBL club in the High Street.

David Cast ~Brief Encounters

I often spoke to David (who died a few months ago, aged 93) after the 10.15 am Sunday services. However, it was not until we discussed our school days, we realized with great surprise, we had both briefly attended the same senior school, between 1945 – 1946. We were transferred from our previous school in Manor Park and East Ham to Sandringham School at Forest Gate.

I did not know David particularly well at school as he an academic year ahead of me. He was also the school captain and I was only a lowly secretary of one of the school houses.

Like most young men at the age of 18 we had to serve a period of National Service for our King (George VI) and Country. I think David may have been was one of the few National Service airmen who actually served as aircrew. He qualified as a RAF Wireless Operator. When he returned to civilian life he joined the Solicitors, Law and Stationery Co in the City of London, as a salesman to the legal profession.

David enjoyed many interests and also meeting people. He was equally happy spending a quiet afternoon with his rod, line and sinker.

As many people are aware, David was greatly involved with the setting up and running of the RAF Heritage Centre in Suttons Lane. He was pleased he could make this contribution to the RAF and all it had meant to him. David was a true gentleman with a keen sense of humour. He always had a kind word to say about his fellow Christian brothers and sisters, and simply wished everyone well. It was always a delight to be in conversation with him.

His presence amongst us will be sorely missed and particularly because of his contribution to the welfare of our church of St Andrew's God Bless you David!

St James the Least of All

Editor: The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tonguein-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace'...

On why Carol Services are so dangerous . . .

From: The Rectory, St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

So, you are excited about being invited to plan your first Carol Service. The dangers involved are only slightly less than being invited to judge the best cake made by the Ladies' Group. You seem to have no idea of the lifelong offence you will inevitably cause. In decades to come when you will either be a seasoned old clergyman – or more likely a double glazing salesman – you will be remembered as "the Curate who offended Mrs Smith."

First, you have to decide which groups are going to be represented to give the readings. If the Brownies were asked last year, then it has to be the Cubs this time. But don't forget that every third year, the Boys' Brigade must be asked, or they will take their revenge and get their flag tangled in the nave chandelier come Remembrance Sunday. If someone represents the choir, then over a four year period, all four voice parts must be called on – and if the organist isn't asked on the fifth year, then all hymns subsequently will be played at double speed and with one verse missing. Should one person have been invited to read for two successive years, then their annual appearance thereafter will be taken as an inalienable right for the rest of their lifetime – and probably longer than that. To drop them may well invoke legal proceedings.


Then there is the batting order to be considered. Someone from the church council will take it as a deliberate slight if they are placed lower in the order than a representative of the Men's Fellowship and no self-respecting bell ringer would voluntarily follow a brass cleaner.

If you do not specify where they should read from and how the readings should end, then a form of ecclesiastical inflation will happen. If the first reader speaks from the chancel step, the next one will go to the lectern; after the sanctuary and pulpit have been utilised, the final reader will probably ask you to move so he can take your place. The variations on "Here endeth", "This is the Word of the Lord", and "Thanks be to God", are endless and will increase in length as the Service progresses. The final reader will probably end with a lengthy exegesis on what he thinks the passage means, correcting whatever you said in your sermon.

I once made the mistake of not telling all readers which Bible translation to use. One, an Old Testament expert, therefore decided to read in Hebrew. Not to be outdone, another read her Gospel passage in Greek – apologising beforehand that it may not be a perfect rendering, as she was spontaneously translating it from the English. And some say Christians are not competitive.

You have two alternatives: either repeat last year's Service without any alteration, saying that it could not be improved, or design your own – and then take Christmas off.

Christmas Past ~ Recollections of Christmas in the Parish post war.

The William of Wykeham Guild was founded in 1951 by Revd. Michael Wall for 18 to 30 year olds. Part of their outreach was the adoption of old folk with individual members forming a friendship with the O.A.P. visited throughout the year. It became the custom for Guild members to meet on Christmas morning and set off in a fleet of cars to visit most of them in turn as well as the Sunrise Lodge retirement home.

There are happy memories of those visits which included the Whitely Circus Family of clowns and their mother who had been a bare back horse rider in her working days. Elsewhere there was an elderly gentleman who had an ancient organ in his sitting room, which accompanied the carol singing, another had a small gauge railway track laid out in his back garden (!) and there was lady who had a muchloved cat who was the centre of attention! Characters all.

Two carol singing memories:

In the 1970's a group of us (late teens and early twenties) from the Sunday night discussion group (run by curate Colin Travers) went carol singing around the Dury Falls estate and Emerson Park. It was always the folk on Dury Falls who gave the most to our collections.

Later, in the 1990's a group from St Matthew's went carol singing in the surrounding roads. We did not collect for anything, but put leaflets through doors with a Christmas message and Service details. Sometimes people would come out of their homes and offer us money, and it always made an impression when we said we were not asking for money, but just wanted to wish them a happy Christmas and invite them to the local Church.

As a child, my mum would always buy a Toy for me to take to The Nativity Service, as the toy would be given to the local Women's Refuge for children who had had to flee from Domestic Violence. It taught me the value of sharing and I loved to think, as a child, that

somebody was opening a present on Christmas Day that I had given him or her and hoped they liked it. Baby Fellowship had a Christmas Party. Auntie Cath would do the story and Auntie Dorothy would play the piano. Auntie Sarah and Auntie Barbara would give us all sweets, my mum would help with games, and Father Christmas would come and give us all a present. One Christmas our son, Christopher, at Baby Fellowship was going around saying Happy Christmas to everyone and Arthur Dines had come to pick up Auntie Dorothy and Christopher said "Happy Christmas" to him and he said it was the most sincere and meant greeting he had been given so he gave him a pound. Christmas Day Service was where you could take your toy to church and show what you had been given, Bikes, prams, toys, dolls and cars were taken to church to show to the clergy and even blessed as well.

It's a Panto – Oh no it isn't!

On the suggestion of Mike and Jane Harder, the Escape Mens' group and Ladies' Time Out group decided to perform Christmas Pantomimes at the Sunday school party, the congregation panto parties, the uniformed groups, HOPWA house and a few care homes in Hornchurch. The performances took place mainly at

St Matthew's church. Various bits of scenery, costumes and props were begged and borrowed...but not stolen.

The first panto performed was Cinderella in January 1995, which I believe was written by the Harders (it



was a long time ago). This was followed by Aladdin – in which I had two hours to learn the part of Widow Twankey as the original Widow fell ill and Kev Wilding and Alan Ruyten performed admirably as Chop and Suey – and Dick Whittington, In which Terry Keens played Dick. By this time, Alan and Kev were writing the scripts, which worked on two levels: the children laughing at the slapstick and the adults hopefully understanding the double entendres; 'That's a nice pear' etc... Over the years the ensemble, which included guest appearances from, among others, Rev. Tara Franklin and Chris Speller as Harry Potter, must have performed every pantomime in the book. The last pantomime was performed in 2013. It was The Emperor's New Clothes. I was the Emperor, parading around in my long Johns. By which time we had exhausted the supply of pantos and were all getting a bit old to be prancing about as women or in our underwear.



We all enjoyed performing the pantos, and especially the postperformance party. I would like to think that we gave the children and adults a fun time after the exertions of Christmas.

Charity of the Month for December Mission Without Borders

About 60 years ago the charity started by smuggling Bibles behind the Iron Curtain so that marginalised people could have access to a Bible after they were challenged by a pastor in the USSR to put a Bible into Eastern European hands and so reach those of faith without access to one. They also gave materials to persecuted Christians. With the collapse of the Iron Curtain and barriers, Mission without Borders' remit changed to bring spiritual, emotional and educational material to those in need regardless of belief. The core values of the charity are to reach impoverished people and communities for Christ and to bring healing, help and hope.

This year sees the Operation Christmas Love campaign which aims to give a box of essential food for the hungry and traumatised children and families facing a Christmas of war. There are children in Ukraine who are not with their families or sheltering in basements of homes. They live under the stress and fear of war. Some families are in refugee buildings but even these have few resources. A donation of £30 would buy an emergency Christmas box. 
