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

The Bishop of Chelmsford's New Year message

For many people, celebrations at New Year are marked by grand gestures: large gatherings and spectacular fireworks; lavish feasts and late nights. There's probably something about wanting to recognise the significance of the past year and properly mark its ending; but also a deliberate leaning into that which lies ahead – eager anticipation for what the New Year might bring. There's nothing wrong with a good party at New Year, but many of us will also recognise how the glitz and glamour can sometimes

provide a cover for the deeper complex of emotions we often experience as the old year passes to the new: those little successes and failures, joys and sorrows, hopes and regrets that have shaped us.

- The truth is that, whether it's New Year or any other time of year, if we focus too much on the extravagant and large scale we might just miss some of the poignancy contained in the smaller treasures: the sight of the first tiny bulbs poking through the soil, hints of a lighter evening sky, a small act of kindness from a friend, gentle signs of healing in a relationship that's been damaged.
- In the life of the church, too, as we look for the signs of the coming of God's kingdom, it's perhaps natural to seek out the exciting and remarkable. The prophecy of Jesus, recorded in Matthew's Gospel, about "the son of man seated at the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven" (Matt 26:64) would seem to speak to this. Again, there's nothing wrong with this and it's part of the Christian story. At the same time, it's perfectly possible to catch glimpses of the kingdom in the smaller, more ordinary things of life. And to notice these we have to resist being dazzled by those things which appear



impressive and successful and we must be open to seeing God in the small and marginal. To recognise Christ in unlikely people and places is to be alive to the signs of God's presence which might otherwise easily pass us by.

- My sense is that much of the church's life is like this. Small things, acts of love and generosity which may not, by themselves, feel particularly significant, but gathered together transform the worlds we inhabit. These are tangible reminders of God's ongoing love and presence in our communities.
- So as the first bulbs begin to poke their way through the Spring soil, beautiful in their fleeting vulnerability, I give thanks for the small and fragile ways in which God's kingdom is evident here in Chelmsford Diocese. These are signs which require us to slow down, stay awhile, and look closely. As we do so this New Year, may we be encouraged and renewed in faith and may our hearts be filled with joy for the many ways in which God is at work in the world.

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
My favourite moment of many

St James the Least of All

On the peculiarities of ordination candidates . . .

From: The Rectory, St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

I was quite happy to see the young person from your church whom you are encouraging to get ordained – even though we did not entirely see eye to eye.

When I answered the door to someone dressed in T-shirt, jeans and trainers, I naturally assumed he was the gardener; it was only after I had given him the wheelbarrow and shown him where the spades were, that I found out who he really was. His assurance that this is how Jesus would dress, were He to visit in person again, jarred somewhat. I think that a three-piece suit and stout pair of brogues would be far more likely. We agreed to differ.

I was interested to hear that he was a church musician. Wanting to know if he sang tenor or bass, or even played the organ, he told me that he was the drummer in the worship band and provided backing vocals. I felt obliged to comment that I was not sure how that would fit in with Mattins, but he told me that he had never heard of that Service, and only attended Mega Rock Praise. Since I suspected it would not have been written by Cranmer, we moved on.

I had hoped we may have been on safer ground when I asked him whether he preferred early perpendicular or Victorian gothic, but as he had apparently only ever worshipped in your converted cinema, he was unable to offer any opinion. His reaction to my offer to show him round our late Norman church prompted him to tell me that he believed all churches should be closed and people should gather in each other's homes, like the early Christians.

In a last despairing attempt to find common ground I asked him if he had ever preached. He was slightly apologetic to admit that he had done so very rarely, as he found it took such a long time to write an hour-long sermon. When I mentioned that I did not think I had ever exceeded eight minutes in my entire life, he gave me such a look of withering astonishment that it was only with heroic Christian charity, that I did not beat him over the head with the Bible he was carrying.





Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery ~ Twin Towers I

Back in October, on hearing that I was about to go on holiday to Hunstanton in Norfolk, Professor Martin recommended a visit to the parish church of nearby Snettisham. He told me the spire of St Mary's was the model for the Anglican Christ Church Cathedral of the diocese of Fredericton in Canada. There is not a direct Hornchurch connection (other than both have an impressive parish church with a significant tower and spire) but why not; there is life north of the A127. The whole church is very impressive and contains the Snettisham Heritage centre of local history. According to the leaflet I was given, the tower and spire are 175 feet high. The spire was originally finished around 1390 and rebuilt in 1895. It is visible from some distance and like St Andrew's is a marker for mariners, here it is The

about organising a more suitable cathedral for the new country than the modest wooden church currently in use. Bishop Medley was an enthusiast of the Ecclesiological Society, a reformist Anglican movement that sought a return to the architecture of the Middle Ages. He engaged two architects for the project. First was Frank Wills also an enthusiast for the mediaeval style; he was followed by William Butterfield who worked on the final design. Before he left for Canada Bishop Medley sent Frank Wills to Snettisham to look closely at St Mary's as the model for the Canadian cathedral. When they saw the plans the Ecclesiological Society declared that magnificent as




Wash not the Thames. But it is not so obvious within the village; however, a sign saying Church Road was a BIG clue. *Photograph above*. The only Norfolk spire more impressive is that at Norwich cathedral. There are some lovely windows and an interesting font *(top right, looking to east window)*. I looked up the history of Christ Church Fredericton. Bishop John Medley was sent to the See of Fredericton in 1845 from Exeter cathedral. He immediately set St Mary's is as a parish church a little more was needed for a Cathedral. Adjustments were made to the height of the roof, the height of the tower increased and features like the clerestory windows were copied from Exeter Cathedral, the East window from Selby Abbey, the clock is a copy of Big Ben in London and the west window and aisle windows also copied from Snettisham and made by the Beer studio of Exeter. The original design was for two towers but this was too expensive and was changed to one, shorter than intended, heightening the similarity to Norfolk. However, it was not built in

stone but wood covered with zinc. This spire and the bells melted in 1911 in the fire that followed a lightning strike. The new tower was rebuilt to the original specification of 198 feet and still closely resembles that of St Mary's. *Photograph above right.*

Nikolaus Pevsner called St Mary's Snettisham 'the most exciting Decorated parish church in Norfolk. According to the Fredericton Heritage Trust Christ Church 'is universally regarded as the most important





Gothic Revival building in North America.' Snettisham is an easier visit from Hornchurch and I can recommend the area.


