Easter is, of course, later in the calendar this year and we may be celebrating in warmer and – definitely – lighter times as welcome the longer days. As I have been preparing this, we have been experiencing the first of some bright days this year (and some have even been warm).

There is definitely a sense of greater wellbeing when the sun shines, individually and as a community. It is almost as though we collectively relax and unwind a little from the tension that is held when we are cold and trying to keep warm in the midst of winter.

In some ways I feel this is similar to when we experience life in the light of the Son, the Light of the World. We can relax in the light and warmth of Christ's presence as we hand over our cares and concerns to the Lord whether that be in receiving God's forgiveness for our sins or in knowing – as the Psalmists did – that in the midst of troubles or dark times, God continues to be by our side. Holding us, carrying us, when and where necessary.

In our worship together, day by day and week by week, we express our wonder and praise of God in various ways, including through music, imagery and words. Yet, it always feels that we are never able to capture all that it means to express our thoughts about, or gratitude to, God.

Words never quite express exactly what we might mean. We have been exploring some of this in the Lent Course, thinking on how the early church grappled with meanings and belief that we take for granted today, as they debated and developed the Nicene Creed over 1,600 years ago! And how, all these years later, we continue to grapple with meaning and understanding of what God is saying to us and inspiring us to be, as we serve one another and the parish we are privileged to be a part of.

Even though we are still in Lent, I am excited at the anticipation of our Easter Revd Canon Ken Wylie Sunday services gathering in joyful and



wonder-filled celebrations at the thought that the Creator and Almighty God loved us so much as to enter the world – like us – and yet gave everything for us, dying and defeating death in the Resurrection to bring new life and hope to each one of us.

In the midst of uncertain and troubling times when individual leaders of nations seem to hold so much sway over international affairs, I hope we can be comforted to know God for ourselves and to be assured that ALL of creation WILL bow down before God and acknowledge our Saviour and holder of true Peace. We are equal before our Maker!

Let us rejoice and respond accordingly, in our praise and worship and in our actions as we pray for one another and the needs of the world.

And may we all be able to find space to spend time in the best version of Sonbathing, allowing God's presence and peace to minister to our needs.

It is a little early to be saying this when Bullseye is first published but let us be ready, on Easter Sunday, to shout out "Christ is risen; He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

Steps

At 88, one tends to look back, more than one looks forward, and one thing I am beginning to see is that my life has been a series of steps. Born into a non-churchgoing family, I vaguely believed in God, and, as someone who thought a lot (but didn't do much!), I realised that I would have to take a step forward in my Christian life, otherwise it would pass me by!

My first step was to emigrate to New Zealand, where my second step was to attend church in Auckland, acknowledging that, if God existed, it was important that I get to know Him. The third step was a really important one - to commit to what I had learnt and was Confirmed on my return to UK. Years of learning, and growing commitment followed - step

So, step 5 was accepting what God was saying to me - to train as a Reader, then ordination eventually when women were admitted. Since then, I have been, and still am, learning about the God I follow. It seems to me, that when one takes a step forward, it is then, and only then, that we see more clearly what the next step will be.

Of course, there will always be fallow periods, or times when life sweeps us along. But, ultimately, we realise that while our human life will one day end, our Christian life is still just beginning. God never lets us down when we listen to Him, and life is truly changed for the better. I wonder what is in store for you and

me next?!


Blessing of Bell Ringers' Peal Board Given in Memory of Andrew Salisbury

During the morning service on 9th March, Revd Ken blessed our new peal board, gave thanks for the work of the bell ringers and prayed for their continued service within the church.

Many of the peals rung at St Andrew's have been for significant Royal occasions and there are a number of peal boards already in the tower.

For example, there are peal boards celebrating the Silver Wedding Anniversary of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth (who we knew as the Queen Mother) in 1948 and also one for the Golden Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II in 2002.

Our most recent peal board is a double peal board celebrating two very special events in our country's recent history side by side on the same board. The first peal commemorates our late monarch, Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee (70 years on the throne) in 2022 and next to that is the recent Coronation peal of King Charles III in 2023. We decided to get this beautiful, hand-made board not only because they were such special occasions but also because we were given a very



generous donation in memory of one of our former ringers, Andrew Salisbury; and his name is remembered on the board. Andy Salisbury was taught to ring by former Ringing Master, Frank Gant, and he rang at St Andrew's from 1947 – 65 before moving to Norwich to further his teaching career. Andy's brother, Donald, also rang at Hornchurch and Andy was also a

member of the William of Wykeham Guild where he made a life-long friendship with former PCC member, Dicky Bird, who wishes to be remembered along with Andy. The peal board was designed and constructed by Barbara Caswell. Barbara moved to England from America and started her own design business in Haselmere, Surrey, whilst simultaneously learning to ring at her local church. She then combined her design skills with her bell ringing hobby and has produced peal boards for a number of churches in London and Southern England. The crown on our peal board was the crown used on the Olympic (2012) post boxes which Barbara sourced from the internet.

We are very grateful for the donation given for this peal board and delighted that Andrew's son, Martin, and daughter-in-law, Tracey, were able to join us for the blessing on 9th March.

We are the RSPCA East London and Havering Branch CIO, with registered charity number 1207065 (previously known as the RSPCA East London and Havering Branch with registered charity number 285472). Our website is: https://

g.org.uk/We support animals in need across East London, Havering and Harold Hill. We take in cats that are sick, injured, abandoned or in circumstances where there are welfare concerns. These cats usually come in to us via RSPCA inspectors, who have picked up the cats from



Basil came to us from a multi-cat household. He'd clearly had to fight for food and would gobble down all the food we gave him straightaway, to the point of making himself sick. He was extremely shut down and would just sit hunched in his bed with his eyes closed, trying to block out the world. We moved Basil to a foster home for some one-on-one TLC and care. With a consistent feeding routine and lots of love, Basil is gradually relaxing, asking for fuss, and even starting to play a little!

situations where the cat is in immediate need, but we also take in cats from members of the public where there is an urgent welfare issue. We care for these cats, provide a safe boarding environment, all vet care needed, behavioural and physical rehabilitation, lots and lots of TLC, and find them appropriate homes when they're ready. We also provide advice to the public

in many areas on a daily basis, such as animal cruelty or welfare concerns, wildlife care, giving up animals, and general pet care. We support our local inspectorate team, providing equipment such as carriers and leads when needed.

We fundraise in person and online, run social media comms to provide advice on animal care and rehoming appeals, carry out all required governance activities and manage a small number of volunteers. We regularly fundraise in store at our partner Pets at Home store to raise awareness and engage with people. Last year we rehomed 102 cats, all vaccinated, microchipped and neutered. We currently have 17 cats in our care, and you can find out a bit more about them below.

As you can see from the above, a lot of cats that come into our care need not only expensive vet treatment, but often extensive rehabilitation. This all comes at a cost. Each RSPCA branch is a separate charity so we are fully responsible for running it ourselves, and our branch has no paid staff – we are all volunteers with full time day jobs.

Times are hard but we will always do the very best we can for all the cats that come into our care. Anything you can do to help would be appreciated so much - whether that's a donation, buying something from our Amazon wishlist, or making blankets for our cats to take to their new homes with

them!



Further to Natalie's information, if you wish to donate via St Andrew's you can as usual by giving Cheques payable to 'Hornchurch PCC' with COM RSPCA written on the back. We will collate the donations and send them on. If you are interested in knitting the small blankets for the cats they have to be approximately 25 x 25 cm and you will need to contact the branch to arrange to send or drop them off (they are in Noak Hill).

The Revd Canon Ken Wylie


March 9th 2025, was the day St Andrew's gained its third Canon.

Last year, Canons Nathan Whitehead and Marlene Wylie were installed as Lay Canons of Chelmsford Cathedral; this year, our Vicar, Ken, joined them as an Honorary Non-residentiary Canon of the Cathedral. To be made Canon is a recognition by the Bishop for distinguished service to the Diocese or the Church of England and is indeed an honour. Clergy Canons have the right to wear the coat of arms of the Diocese on their preaching scarf. Lay Canons wear an academic gown edged with light blue, bearing the coat of arms of the Diocese. The service was within Choral Evensong, which was beautifully sung and included the first public outing for the newly formed girls' choir, which made the whole day more special. The three new Canons from across the diocese, along with an ecumenical Canon, Revd Christian Krieger, who was also the preacher, made oaths to the Bishop and the Dean of the Cathedral.

A couple of questions have arisen since the announcement of Ken's appointment, which we can answer easily - he isn't about to be fired (boom, boom), nor is he about to go anywhere else. The position of Canon is simply a title (yes, with some commitments to the College of Canons), but it is not a new "job." Ken remains as our Vicar and Area Dean of Havering. In being made Canon, he recognises and thanks the huge support he receives within the parish and deanery, acknowledging that if he has achieved anything, it is built upon the amazing and selfless giving of time, energy, gifts and talents of clergy, leaders and countless volunteers who ensure that we can maintain our presence within the community that we are called to serve.

Ken has been humbled by the many messages of congratulations he has received, and he thanks those who were able to attend the Choral Evensong in person on this special occasion.







Why we say West HAM, and not West'um

Professor Ged Martin, who until 2020 wrote a column in the Romford Recorder on local history, has very kindly allowed Bullseye to reproduce some of his essays about the history of Hornchurch and Havering from his website at https://www.gedmartin.net/martinalia-mainmenu-3.

This article was contributed to the *Newham Recorder* in July 2020. It argues that the pronunciation of West HAM (not West'um) reflects the continuing influence of an Anglo-Saxon four-letter word.

Have you ever wondered we say West HAM and East HAM, but talk of Dagen'um not DagenHAM – and, of course, New'um? The answer goes back over a thousand years, to two similar words in the Old English language, "ham", meaning a farm or settlement, and the much less common "hamm", denoting riverside grazing land.

We can trace Dagenham back thirteen hundred years, to 692 AD, when it was "Deccanhaam", the farm of somebody called Daecca. Photograph above—God's Little Acre, St Peter's Dagenham wild flower garden.

Waltham Abbey was named not after a person but from its location. It has the same origin as North and South Weald, which refer to forest. Thus Newham's next-door neighbour, Waltham Forest, means "forest place forest"!

You might think it's odd that a word referring to something so basic as a farm should have died out as Old English evolved into our modern form of speech. In fact, its influence is still around. We use a diminutive version: just as a piglet is a small pig, so a hamlet is a small settlement. And "ham" itself turned into a word that means a lot to us all. Through a

process called vowel shift, it s become "home". We share the basic term with the Germans, but with them the vowel moved in a different direction, making their word for home "heim". North of the Border, poet Robert Burns used the traditional Scots form "hame". Maybe that sounds quaint to us Sassenachs, but the Scots word is probably closest to the original.

Sometimes "ham" was used as the first syllable of a placename, often protectively padded with the letter P: Hampstead was the farm place, Hampton the farm enclosure. More often, "ham" was the final syllable, which probably explains how it's



become gulped down to a mere 'um sound. There is an interesting variant in place—names like Corringham, referring to "the people of Curra". Photograph below, the Bull pub Corringham

Corringham
Here "ham" must describe the settlement of the followers of some Saxon chieftain, not just a small farm. An intriguing example is Nottingham. In 922 AD, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle called it "Snotingaham" - the settlement of the followers of Snota. The letters -sn- are impossible to pronounce together in French, so the Normans dropped the S. Luckily, Snottingham became Nottingham. East and West Ham weren't called after farms, but take their name from that similar but less common word, "hamm". The double-M suggests that it was more emphatically spoken. There are about a dozen other places called Ham across southern England, mostly small and low-lying, but all

firmly pronounced. The best-known is

Ham Common at Richmond-upon-Thames in south-west London. "Hamm" referred to grazing land, alongside the bend of a river. There's a similar word in Frisian, an ancient language of the Netherlands which resembles English. The bend of the Thames is still there. That specialised grazing land is now Silvertown and London City Airport. A recent housing development, Hamme Building at Royal Albert Wharf, happily revives the old name.

A document from the year 958 – over a thousand years ago – shows that Hamme was a single community. It had been split by the time of Domesday Book in 1086, but both parts shared the name, spelt "Hame". North of the pastureland there were woods – "frith" in Old English. They're recalled by Manor Park's Hamfrith Road. We first hear, in fake Latin, of "Westhamma" in 1186, and "Estham" in 1206. But even with those new names, local peasants knew they were talking about "hamm", describing grazing land, not the wobbly "ham" that referred to a farm and was swallowed at the end of a word. West Ham never degenerated into West'um.

Centuries later, we preserve that difference inherited from forgotten Old English speech – West HAM, East HAM. When the two were merged to form a London Borough in 1965, a neutral name was coined – New-HAM. But the half-mumbled "ham" was just

too familiar, and so nowadays it's become New -'um! Sources: P.H. Reaney, *The Place -Names of Essex* (Cambridge, 1935) and E. Ekwall, *The Concise Oxford Dictionary of English Place-Names* (4th ed., Oxford, 1960, first ed. 1936).




